MEMORANDUM

RE: 3RD QTR Budget Report for Fiscal Year 2019/2020

BACKGROUND:

Each quarter of the fiscal year, district staff, with the assistance of its independent financial advisor, prepares an overview of the fire district's current budget status. These economic progress reports provide a snap-shot view of district revenues and expenditures that assist district staff and the Board of Directors in monitoring fund balances. These financial reports also offer much needed data for the development of budget for the upcoming fiscal year. This report will also provide some analysis based on current conditions and published financial information.

RECITAL:

What makes this 3rd quarter report unique is the current declared state of emergency and the possible long lasting economic effects of this emergency. The Fire District, although more insulated than a City, is not immune from this economic disruption of the pandemic. Although it is impossible to forecast how severe those impacts may be, the District has already taken steps to soften those possible impacts through the conservative day to day operations as well as fiscal planning.

The Fire District is currently operating under the FY19/20 operating budget that was adopted by the Board of directors during the August 2019 Board meeting. The attached reports and analysis summarizes the District's financial position for the period ending March 31, 2020.

3rd QUARTER FINANCIAL RESULTS - REVENUE:

When preparing the fiscal year 19/20 operating budget district staff, under the guidance of the District Board of Directors, took a conservative approach to predicted ending revenue fund balances. That approach on revenue projections elevated the district financial position as of March 31, 2020, slightly over its projected budget. Although historical data show the current economic climate should not impact the District, for two to three years, a continued conservative approach is recommended during the creation of the FY20/21 budget.

3rd QUARTER RESULTS – EXPENDITURES:

As of March 31, 2020, the total overall operating budget is tracking less than the projected budget, and all District programs are operating within designed budget limits.

CONCLUSION:

Overall, revenue and expenditures are as planned and budgeted. In addition, the District is continuously looking to secure other sources of revenues and to remain financially prudent and good stewards of public funding.

RE: Senate Bill No. 1205

BACKGROUND:

After the devastating Ghost Ship Fire in Oakland, the California Senate put forth Senate Bill 1205 (attachment A). This Senate Bill was approved by the Governor on September 27, 2018, and added to Section 13146.4 (attachment B) of the California Health and Safety Code.

RECITALS:

Existing law requires the Fire Chief or designee of any city, county or district fire department providing fire protection services and his or her authorized representatives to inspect every building within his/her jurisdiction for compliance and enforcement of the California Fire Code and Uniform Building Standards as they pertain to fire and life safety, not less than once each calendar year. Every structure used in the following manner shall be inspected; public or private school, structures, including hotels, motels, lodging houses, and apartment houses,

Senate Bill 1205 requires every city or county fire department, city and county fire department, or District required to perform the above-described inspections to report annually to its administering authority, as defined, on the department's or district's compliance with the above-described inspection requirements, as provided. The bill requires the administering authority to acknowledge receipt of the report in a resolution or a similar formal document.

CONCLUSION:

The Rodeo – Hercules Fire Protection District recognizes the authority of the State of California to amend Section 13146.4 of the Health and Safety Code. Furthermore, the Rodeo – Hercules Fire Protection District to meet and exceed the requirements of SB1205, in addition to the before-mentioned inspection requirements, conduct annual company inspections of all Businesses located within the Fire District. Staff is recommending the passage of Resolution 2020-03, acknowledging the compliance of SB1205 by the District.

RESOLUTION NO. 2020-03

RESOLUTION OF THE RODEO – HERCULES FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT ACKNOWLEDGING THE COMPLIANCE WITH SENATE BILL 1205

WHEREAS, the Rodeo Hercules Fire Protection District in an effort to prevent fires and risks to the public safety conduct annual fire and life safety inspections and to enforce building standards of all structures specified in Senate Bill 1205 that include hotels, motels, lodging houses, and apartment buildings, for compliance with building standards; and

WHEREAS, the Rodeo-Hercules Fire Protection District conducts building inspection pursuant to Section 13146.2 and 13146.3 of the Health and Safety Code; and

WHEREAS, the Rodeo-Hercules Fire Protection District, although not required by Senate Bill 1205, in an effort to prevent fires and risks to the public safety conduct annual fire and life safety inspections and to enforce building standards in all commercial structures located within the fire district boundaries; and

WHEREAS, the Rodeo-Hercules Fire Protection District, although not required by Senate Bill 1205, in an effort to prevent fires and risks to the public safety conduct annual fire and life safety inspections and to enforce building standards in all churches and or places of worship located within the fire district boundaries; and

WHEREAS the Rodeo-Hercules Fire Protection District, although not required by Senate Bill 1205, in an effort to prevent fires and risks to the public safety conduct annual fire and life safety inspections and to enforce building standards in all public schools located within the fire district boundaries; and

NOW, THEREFORE, in furtherance of the above-mentioned, the Rodeo – Hercules Fire Protection District Board of Directors hereby resolves to continue to conduct fire and life safety inspections of all; hotels, motels, lodging houses, and apartment buildings, commercial structures, churches and or places of worship and public schools in accordance with Senate Bill 1205 and Health and Safety Code 13146.2 and 13146.3.

IF ANY PART OF THE RESOLUTION OR ANY ATTACHMENTS TO IT are for any reason determined to be invalid or unconstitutional, such determination shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Resolution or its attachments, and the Board hereby declares that it would have adopted this Resolution, and each section, sub-section, sentence, clause, and phrase hereof, irrespective of any one or more sections, sub-sections, sentences, clauses or phrases being declared invalid or unconstitutional.

Existing law requires the chief of any city or county fire department or district providing fire protection services and his or her authorized representatives to inspect every building used as a public or private school within his or her jurisdiction, for the purpose of enforcing specified building standards, not less than once each year, as provided. Existing law requires every city or county fire department or district providing fire protection services that is required to enforce specified building standards to annually inspect certain structures, including hotels, motels, lodging houses, and apartment houses, for compliance with building standards, as provided.

This bill would require every city or county fire department, city and county fire department, or district required to perform the above-described inspections to report annually to its administering authority, as defined, on the department's or district's compliance with the above-described inspection requirements, as provided. The bill would require the administering authority to acknowledge receipt of the report in a resolution or a similar formal document. To the extent this bill would expand the responsibility of a local agency, the bill would create a state-mandated local program.

The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that, if the Commission on State Mandates determines that the bill contains costs mandated by the state, reimbursement for those costs shall be made pursuant to the statutory provisions noted above.

BILL TEXT

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1.

Section 13146.4 is added to the Health and Safety Code, to read:

13146.4

- (a) Every city or county fire department, city and county fire department, or district required to perform an annual inspection pursuant to Sections 13146.2 and 13146.3 shall report annually to its administering authority on its compliance with Sections 13146.2 and 13146.3.
- (b) The report made pursuant to subdivision (a) shall occur when the administering authority discusses its annual budget, or at another time determined by the administering authority.
- (c) The administering authority shall acknowledge receipt of the report made pursuant to subdivision (a) in a resolution or a similar formal document.
- (d) For purposes of this section, "administering authority" means a city council, county board of supervisors, or district board, as the case may be.

SEC. 2.

If the Commission on State Mandates determines that this act contains costs mandated by the state, reimbursement to local agencies and school districts for those costs shall be made pursuant to Part 7 (commencing with Section 17500) of Division 4 of Title 2 of the Government Code.

Attachment (B)

California Health and Safety Code Section 13146.2

Every city or county fire department or district providing fire protection services required by Sections 13145 and 13146 to enforce building standards adopted by the State Fire Marshal and other regulations of the State Fire Marshal shall, annually, inspect all structures subject to subdivision (b) of Section 17921, except dwellings, for compliance with building standards and other regulations of the State Fire Marshal.

California Health and Safety Code Section 13146.3

The chief of any city or county fire department or district providing fire protection services and his or her authorized representatives shall inspect every building used as a public or private school within his or her jurisdiction, for the purpose of enforcing regulations promulgated pursuant to Section 13143, not less than once each year. The State Fire Marshal and his or her authorized representatives shall make these inspections not less than once each year in areas outside of corporate cities and districts providing fire protection services.

Subject: A Designation of Applicant's Agent Resolution for Non-State Agencies

BACKGROUND:

On March 22, 2020, the President declared the ongoing Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic of sufficient severity and magnitude to warrant a major declaration for the State of California, pursuant to section 501 (b) of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 5121-5207). State, Territorial, Tribal, local government entities and certain private non-profit (PNP) organizations are eligible to apply for Public Assistance.

In accordance with section 502 of the Stafford Act, eligible emergency protective measures taken to respond to the COVID-19 emergency at the direction or guidance of public health officials may be reimbursed under Category B of the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Public Assistance program.

The California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) Recovery Section acts as the grantee for FEMAs Public Assistance program. For the Rodeo-Hercules Fire Protection District to be eligible for federal reimbursements, during what is designated the California COVID-19 Pandemic, all Non-State Agencies are required to adopt the Office of Emergency Services Resolution Form 130 selecting the "Applicant's Agent." The referenced applicant in this process is the Fire District.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the Board of Directors approve the Resolution declaring the Fire Chief, Bryan Craig, as the "Agent" for the district in all matters concerning federal reimbursements during the California COVID-19 Pandemic event.

CCCERA

Contra Costa County Employees Retirement Association supplied this information as part of their monthly newsletter:

The COVID-19 global pandemic and resulting shelter in place orders have impacted the market and investment returns of pension funds across the globe. Since CCCERA's last update to participating employers regarding the economic and financial impact from COVID-19, there has been a truly unprecedented response from the Federal Reserve to support both the mechanics of the global banking system as well as the financial markets directly, coupled with more than \$2 trillion from the CARES Act to now support businesses and individuals. Similar fiscal and monetary responses have been enacted to lesser degrees in most developed markets. As a result, global equities and corporate debt have rallied from the lows experienced in the third week of March. Nevertheless, the economic contraction continues as a result of shelter in place orders and other responses to the pandemic.

CCCERA's functional asset allocation approach to dividing the portfolio into Growth, Diversifying and Liquidity sub-portfolios worked largely as expected in the first quarter with the Growth sub-portfolio falling less than the broad equity markets, Diversifying offering a partial hedge to the declines in the Growth portfolio and Liquidity offering modest gains. It should be noted that all benefit payments are paid from the Liquidity portfolio, and as such, CCCERA has not had to sell any Growth assets at impaired prices. CCCERA has engaged in measured rebalancing throughout March and April to maintain its long-term strategic allocations.

This is a testament to why CCCERA is one of the most stable retirement systems in the state.

Labor Relations – Personnel - Crew safety and protection, as always, remain our most significant concern. Crews are strictly following CDC, County Health, and the Medical Director's guidelines on personal protective equipment, EMS responses, and decontamination. Decontaminating aerosol sprayers have been purchased for both fire stations to aid in decontaminating surfaces. Personnel currently monitor their own health before, when arriving, and during their duty shift. Pesonal protective equipment supplies and burn rates are being monitored and tracked in house. The District is currently following recommended CDC guidelines in response to employee illness and/or exposure to COVID-19. The District now has one employee on longterm worker's compensation leave unrelated to COVID-19. Reporting: Chief Craig

Fire Stations/Training Facility— Currently, district offices are closed to limit outside contact, all group training has been suspended, along with public education functions. Administrative offices and district grounds are closed to public access. Telephone calls to the business line have now been routed to Administrative assistant Kim Corcoran's cell phone. Administrative assistant Tammy Tomas has been furloughed and has volunteered to manage and build our social media pages.

Crews are continuing with regular monthly and mandated training.

Probationary employees are continuing their training and Task Book signoffs. Firefighter Derek Cochnauer

completed the District required Driver/Operator training qualifications.

Facilities – The District has started the process of receiving estimates for the concrete replacement around Fire Station 76, and estimates for leveling the classroom.

Grants/Rembursments – LUCUS device grant has been submitted to FEMA, and awardees should be announced sometime in August. Currently, there is no indication that the pandemic will have any effect on federal grants. The District has submitted its application to FEMA and receved authorization to apply for federal reimbursements.

Incident Activity – The District still is seeing a reduction in EMS calls but a higher than average increase in significant emergency incidents involving vehicle accidents. A portion of the decrease in EMS responses can be attributed to emergency medical dispatching and recommendations to patients to call their primary care physicians.

Community Risk Reduction – Company conducted business inspections are currently on hold. The District's website and new Facebook page will continue to be populated with relevant information about the Fire District and current events.

Community /Wildfire Prevention –. Fuel reduction and creation of defensible space in the wildland-urban interface areas of the District will begin operations around May 18th. Distribution of weed abatement notices to the public as well as all homeowner association has already started. The District encourages all homeowners to have their weed abatement completed by July 1st. Staff will continue to prepare for this year's wildland fire season by continuing to work with homeowners, city officials, and homeowner associations, to address wildfire prevention and wildfire risk management.

Apparatus –All-District first line apparatus went through a decontamination process that was provided through Contra Costa County Fire District. Both new pieces of apparatus are in their primary stages of manufacturing. Communication was made with the apparatus suppliers, and they currently gave no indication of a delay in delivery. The lease agreement for the apparatus will be presented to the board during the June Board meeting. District Staff have negotiated an equipment exchange with Phillips Refinery for surplus Engine 75A.

Fiscal Stabilization – Fire Facilities Fee CPI increase for FY20/21 is 5.6% and will be presented for adoption to the Hercules City Council and the County Board of Supervisors. The FY2020/21 budget is being developed using these parameters: budget only verified revenues, keep all program allocations the same as our current budget, and add a program for infectious disease control, and only use a 2% increase for FY22/23. The draft budget will be presented for adoption at the June regular board meeting and then pass a final budget with adjustments in September. All expenditures, including employee costs related to COVID-19, are tracked through software programs.
